




GUIDE TO RECYCLING



MATERIALS	INSTRUCTIONS	ITEMS NOT RECYCLABLE
<p>NEWSPAPER, MAGAZINES & CATALOGS</p> <p>newspaper, magazines, catalogs, phone books, hard/soft cover books</p> 	<p>place in paper bag or on bottom of recycling bin</p>	<p>DO NOT RECYCLE no plastic bags – you may return them to store; napkins, tissue paper, paper towels, wax paper, wrapping paper, any food soiled paper, string</p>
<p>CORRUGATED CARDBOARD</p> <p>recycle all brown corrugated cardboard, brown paper bags, box board (shoe boxes, gift boxes, cereal boxes, cake mix, macaroni, pizza boxes, beer/pop cases, frozen food boxes), waxed corrugated, cardboard lined with foam, cores from carpet rolls or any items made of laminated sheets of paper or cardboard, soft/hard cover books</p> 	<p>no need to remove staples, tape or labels</p>	
<p>GLASS BOTTLES</p> <p>all clear, green and brown food and containers</p> 	<p>rinse thoroughly & drain</p>	<p>DO NOT RECYCLE ceramic bottles and other ceramic items, flower pots, crystal, light bulbs, mirror and window glass, heat resistant ovenware, hypodermic syringes, eyeglasses</p>
<p>METAL CANS</p> <p>all metal food and beverage containers (cans), metal lids, closure caps, aluminum pie tins, clean aluminum foil, silverware, metal/cardboard containers (frozen juice or motor oil), metal cookware</p> 	<p>rinse thoroughly & drain, aerosol cans MUST be empty.</p>	<p>DO NOT RECYCLE propane cylinders, small appliances, paint cans, hypodermic needles – you may dispose of them at any medical facility</p> <p>DO NOT INCLUDE ANY TYPE OF BATTERY.</p>
<p>PLASTIC</p> <p>narrow & wide-mouth containers 1-7, anti-freeze or motor oil containers, furniture, tableware, toys, chairs</p> 	<p>plastics 1 – 7 accepted, rinse & drain thoroughly, also include wide mouth containers (tub butter, cottage cheese, yogurt, whip topping containers)</p>	<p>DO NOT RECYCLE plastic bags, medicine bottles, plexiglas, fast food containers, snack bags and Tupperware (because of residue), bubble wrap, packing peanuts</p>
<p>MILK CARTONS JUICE CARTONS DRINK BOXES</p> <p>gable top beverages, containers including those with plastic spouts, straws, drink pouches</p> 	<p>rinse thoroughly & drain</p>

Change in NYS Law for Electronics Recycling – Effective January 1st, 2015

In accordance with the disposal ban requirements of Section 27-2611 of the Electronic Equipment Recycling and Reuse Act, on **January 1st, 2015**, it will become unlawful for residential households in New York State to place electronic equipment at the curb for disposal.

Due to this change in law, Waste Management will no longer be collecting electronic waste at the curb after 12/31/14 – even if segregated from the rest of the household trash.

Beginning January 1, 2012, with the exception of individual and household consumers, all other NYS consumers including businesses, private or public corporations, not for profit corporations and government entities, etc. were prohibited from disposing of, or place for collection intended for disposal, electronic waste (such as computers, computer peripherals, televisions, small scale servers, and small electronic equipment, etc.)

Beginning January 1, 2015, this disposal ban will apply to all persons in the state, including individual and household consumers.

However, consumers and homeowners do have other options for recycling their electronic waste.

New York State law requires manufacturers to take responsibility for recycling many types of electronic equipment they have produced, such as computers, computer peripherals, televisions, small scale servers, and small electronic equipment, etc. Manufacturers now provide free and convenient acceptances programs for NYS consumers to properly reuse and recycle their waste electronic equipment.

- Retailers that sell electronics offer free recycling of electronic waste. This is in cooperation with the manufacturers of electronics and an extension of their responsibility to operate in New York State.
